

THE JOURNEY: A Guide for Reflection

Interdependence

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"When we try to pick out anything by itself, we find it hitched to everything else in the universe," wrote conservationist, John Muir, in the mid nineteenth century.

In the century or more since Muir co-founded the Sierra Club and advocated for the preservation of Yosemite, science has continually revealed more and more of the processes underlying his observations and intuition as a devoted naturalist.

I like to imagine how it would have tickled Muir to know that trees share resources and communicate with each other by way of subterranean fungal networks called the mycorrhiza, through which carbon, water, nutrients, alarm signals and hormones can pass. Linking nearly every tree in a forest, including those of different species, through this network even a tree on the brink of death can sometimes bequeath a substantial share of its carbon to its neighbours. Similarly, trillions of microbes living in and on our own bodies form the microbiome which plays a key role in alerting our immune system to harmful bacteria and viruses, in breaking down nutrients from food that we can't otherwise access and in stabilizing our circadian rhythms.

In every living process we find "the interdependent web of all existence" affirmed in UUism's 7th Principle.

So much more than simply an environmental ethic, keeping interdependence squarely in our sights can help us to resist temptation toward hyper-individualism and spur us onward in our work for the collective good in the knowledge that "all flourishing is mutual." It's not always easy, but the embrace of interdependence is a source of meaning to which we can whole-heartedly dedicate our lives.

Infinite Spirit – Instill in us the will to recognize and resist attitudes and behaviors that do not serve the whole. Fill us with reverence for a universe in which we are inextricably "hitched to everything else" in ways beyond our human capacity to comprehend.
